

ENROLLMENT COMMITTEE MEMBER NEEDED

Tribal membership is central to the health, welfare, economic security, and political integrity of the Tribe and elemental to the Tribe's very existence as a sovereign and independent political community. The purpose of this Title is to implement Article II, Section 2 of the Constitution and provide rules, regulations, and procedures governing the enrollment and honorary membership of eligible individuals in the Tribe as an exercise of the inherent authority of the Tribe.

The Tribal Council is accepting applications for the Enrollment Committee. Members are paid \$250 stipend per meeting and mileage will be paid for a maximum of 410 miles round trip. All meetings are held in Niobrara, NE. A background check is required.

Understanding the impact of removal policies on Native American communities and families

The removal of Native American children from their families and communities via social services and other governmental agencies has a long and painful history with all Native American communities in the United States. For the future of our communities, it is important to learn about the historical context and contributing factors surrounding the government's forced removal of Native American children from their homes, the devastating impact this removal has had on families and communities, and the efforts that are being made to address these issues.

The forced removal of Native American children via governmental agencies can be traced back to racist beliefs of assimilation into Euro-American culture. In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the government implemented policies aimed at forcibly assimilating Native Americans into mainstream Euro-American culture. This included the establishment of boarding schools, where Native American children were forcibly separated from their families, forbidden from practicing their culture and language, and taught to adopt Western customs.

During this time, Native American children were forcibly removed from their families and placed in boarding schools and foster care or placed with non-Native Americans through social services from every state in America. These removal policies were rooted in the Western belief that by removing children from their cultural environments, they would facilitate Native assimilation into mainstream "American" society. This resulted in the disruption of family ties, cultural loss, and the erasure of Native American identity and traditions. It also resulted in a significant number of Native children dying to disease and murder.

The removal of Native American children has had devastating consequences for individuals, families, and communities that are still with us to today. Children experienced an untold amount of trauma from being forcibly separated from their families, leading to longlasting psychological and emotional effects. Families were torn apart, and traditional kinship systems were disrupted, weakening the fabric of Native American communities. Cultural identity and knowledge were eroded, and the intergenerational transmission of language and traditions was severely impacted.

Recognizing the harmful impact of these removal policies, the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) was enacted by the U.S. Congress in 1978.

ICWA is a federal law designed to protect the best interests of Native American children and preserve their cultural identity. It provides guidelines for child custody proceedings, prioritizing placement with Native American families, extended relatives, or tribal communities. The United States Supreme Court upheld ICWA on 6/15/2023, after three challenges to the legitimacy to the law. Those challenges were seen by many to be an attack to tribal sovereignty and selfgovernance.

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REMOVAL: Continuing efforts needed to heal communities

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In recent years, there has been a growing awareness of the need for reconciliation and addressing the historical trauma inflicted on Native American communities. Efforts have been made to collaborate with tribal governments, support cultural revitalization, and improve compliance with the ICWA. Training programs for child welfare

been implemented to ensure the law's proper implementation and to promote cultural understanding and sensitivity. There is still a lot of work to do with this, but with ICWA being upheld, there is some progress being made.

The removal of Native American children from their families and communities and their placement in social services has had a profoundly negative and long-lasting impact on Native American communities. The historical trauma and cultural loss suffered by these children and their families cannot be understated. The enactment of the ICWA was a significant step towards rectifying the harm caused, prioritizing

the preservation of Native American identity, and promoting family and community cohesion. However, ongoing efforts are needed to ensure the proper implementation of the ICWA and to support healing, reconciliation, and the revitalization of Native American cultures. There is still a lot of work that needs to be done.


